Whittier Greenway Trail

California

The Whittier Greenway Trail occupies part of an abandoned railroad right-of-way in its namesake town, running parallel to



further 2.7 miles along the former railroad easement from Mills Avenue to the A County/Orange County border. Further extensions will provide connections to additional trails running through La Habra and Brea, which will link to the [Santa Ana River Trail](#).

The Whittier Greenway Trail occupies part of an abandoned railroad right-of-way in its namesake town, running parallel to Whittier Boulevard and Lambert Road between Pioneer Boulevard near I-605 and the LA County/Orange County border. An active rail line travels from Mills Avenue to the LA County/Orange County border.

Along this urban, and sometimes noisy, trail you'll find some interesting wind vane sculptures, along with nice landscaping with native California plants. As a bonus to riding the trail take a short detour to nearby Whittier Uptown Historic District a great place to catch a snack, coffee or even a meal from a wide range of restaurants.

The City of Whittier recently extended the trail a

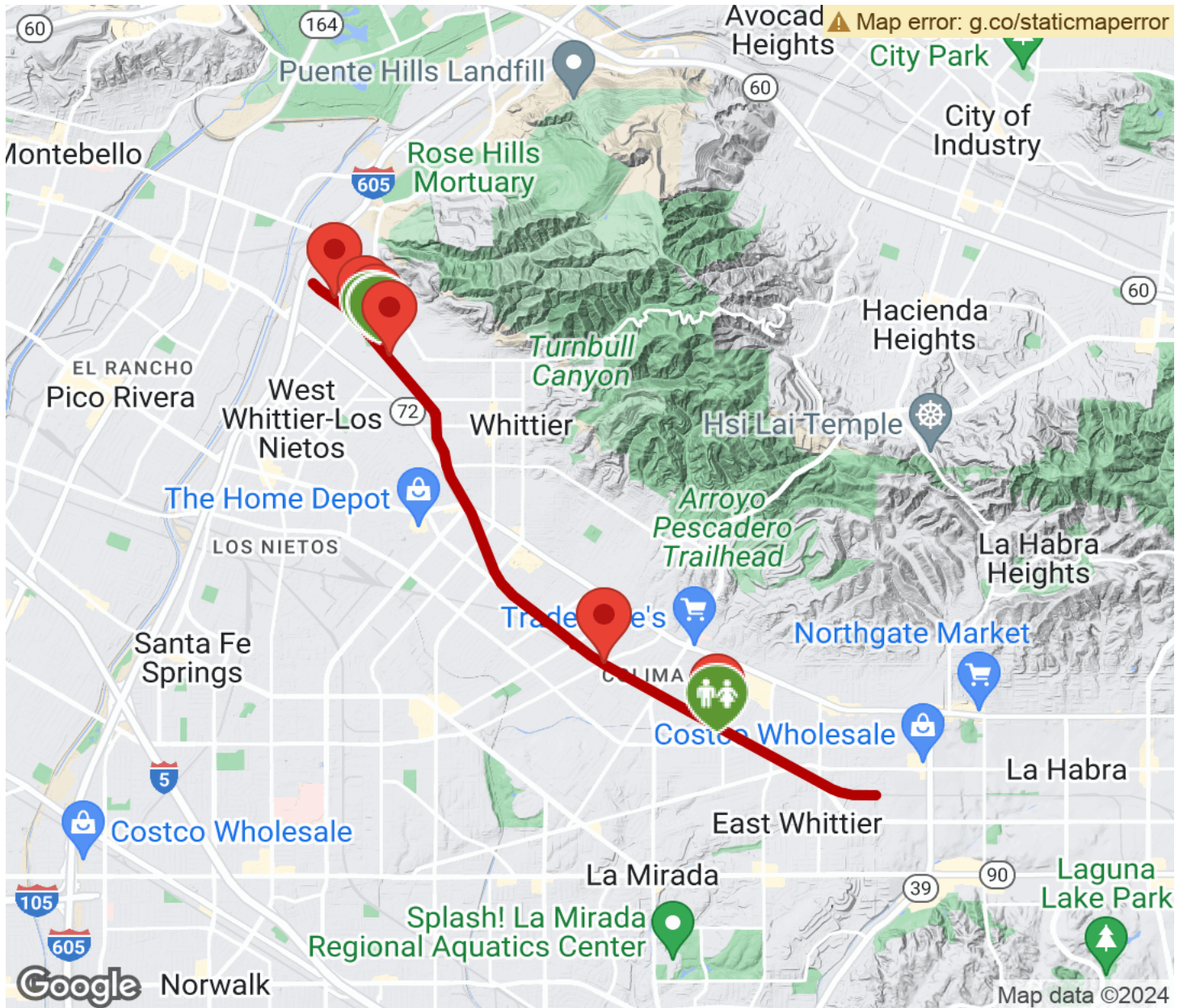
