Overview The Hot Springs Creek Greenway Trail is made up of five seamlessly linked trails: Transportation Plaza Trail, Valley Street



asphalt trail connects the city's downtown with its historical Transportation Depot, sculpture garden, farmers market, skatepark, and playing fields. The trail is also close to Oaklawn Park Race Track, one of the most famous thoroughbred racetracks in North America.

At the south end, the trail crosses under Hollywood Blvd and continues a short 0.2 miles south of the road, reaching a dead end where construction is underway and also the southern end of the trail.

Overview

The Hot Springs Creek Greenway Trail is made up of five seamlessly linked trails: Transportation Plaza Trail, Valley Street Creekwalk, Jaycee/Friendship Trail, the Hollywood Trail, and the Utility Corridor Trail.

The trail runs from 2.66 miles from just south of the famous Bathhouse Row in Hot Springs National Park to Lake Hamilton at the city's southern edge.

About the Route

Trail users can enjoy the walk, run, or ride near the heart of downtown Hot Springs on a dedicated off-road path that parallels Hot Springs Creek for most of its route. The

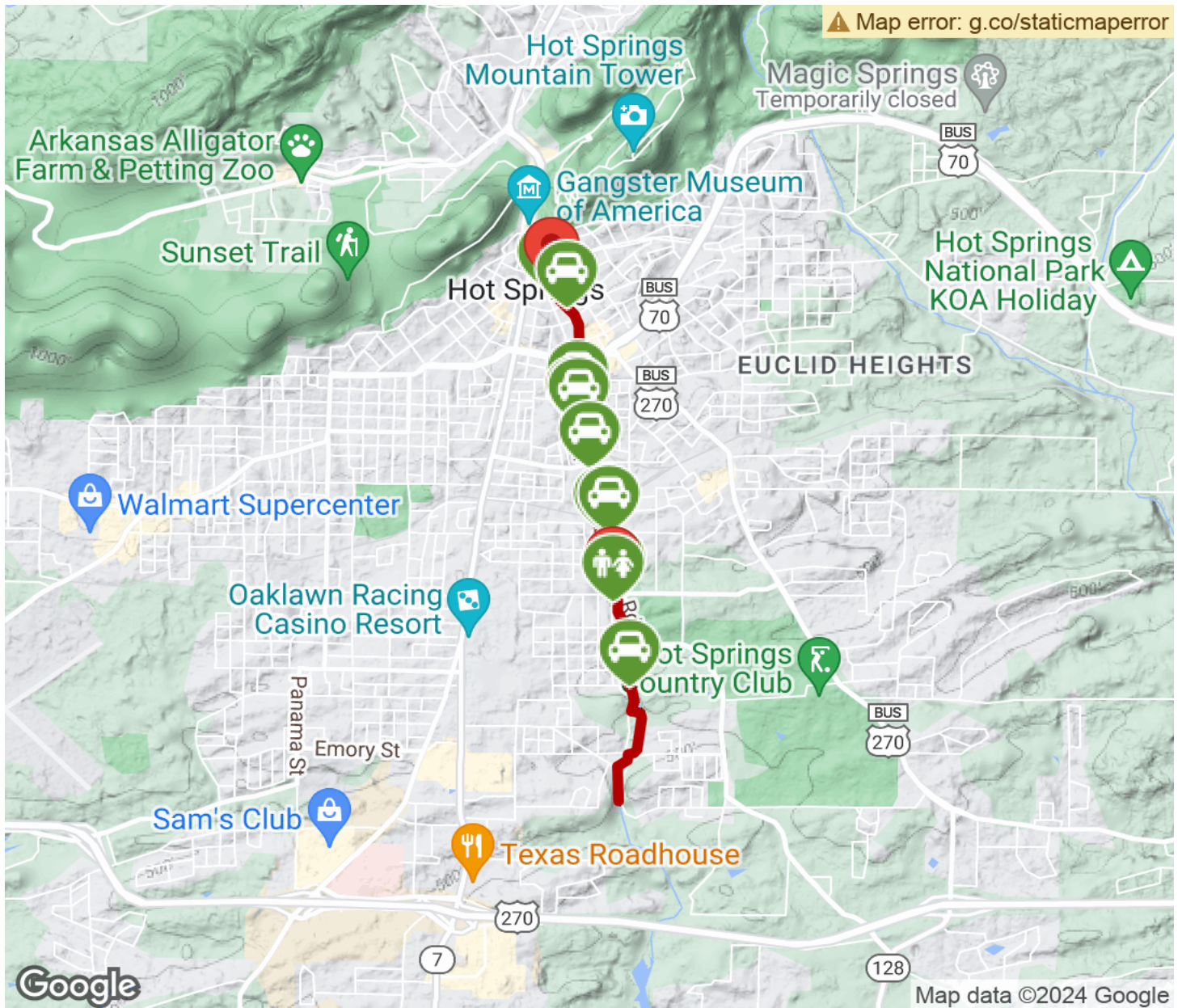
