New homes, parks, and roads are being added in the area every year, and this trail helps to ensure that cyclists and pedestrians aren't left out of the equation. Beginning in the west, the trail starts at Atlas Road near the basketball courts and proceeds east along the road, offering stunning views of the mountain range due east of the city. As per usual in the arid landscape, there is not much shade to be found on the trail, but the route is flat and well-paved, taking trail users past suburban homes and a small, newly-built park before coming to an end at Sonoma Ranch Boulevard. 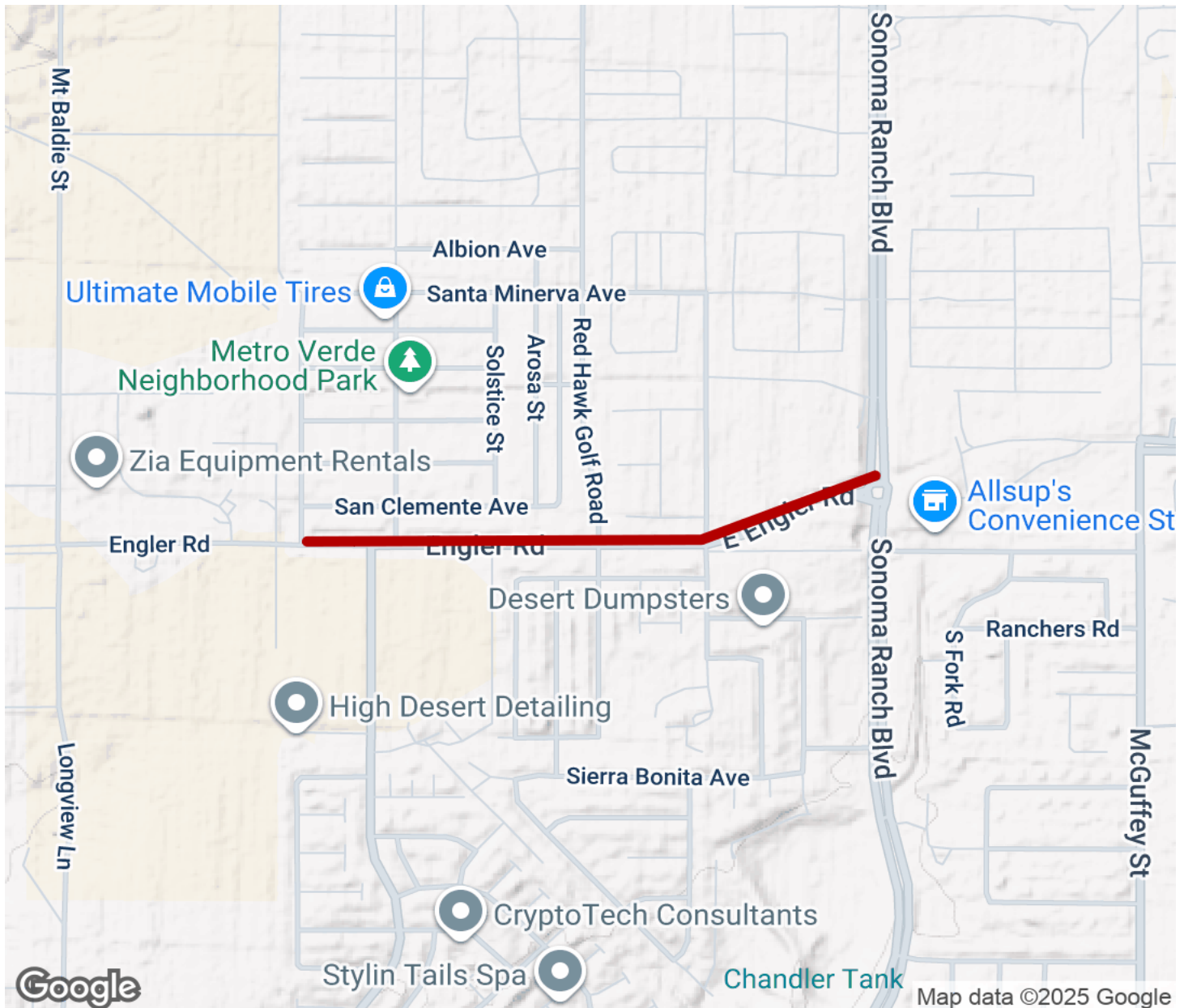
Parking & Trail Access
