Nelson Family Heritage Crossing (Fox River Boardwalk)

The Nelson Family Heritage Crossing is a 1,100-foot pedestrian/bicycle bridge crossing the Fox River between the downtown



accessible for those using mobility aids and the route is lit during dusk hours. The trail is open from dawn to 11 p.m.

The Nelson Family Heritage Crossing is a 1,100-foot pedestrian/bicycle bridge crossing the Fox River between the downtown districts of the Village of Little Chute and the City of Kaukauna. Along with enjoying scenic views of the river, residents and visitors can use the bridge while walking, biking, running, commuting, birdwatching, and fishing.

From Little Chute, trails provide access to the crossing from Island Park (100 Monroe Street) and Heesakker Park. From downtown Kaukauna, a sidewalk connection and a paved rail-trail along Third Street leads to the crossing. The distance from the bridge to downtown Kaukauna is about a mile, and from the bridge to the trailhead parking is roughly $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile.
