Peachtree Creek Greenway

Georgia

The Peachtree Creek Greenway is a planned 12-mile path envisioned to connect the Atlanta Beltline and PATH400 to I-295.



Trail amenities include pathway lighting, benches, trash and recycling cans and bike repair stations. There is accessible parking on both ends, and an additional parking trailhead on Corporate Boulevard.

The next phase of construction will extend the trail from North Druid Hills Road into Atlanta.

The Peachtree Creek Greenway is a planned 12-mile path envisioned to connect the [Atlanta Beltline](#) and [PATH400](#) to I-295. The trail will pass through the cities of Atlanta, Brookhaven, Chamblee, Doraville and other parts of DeKalb County.

The initial phase of construction was completed in Brookhaven in December of 2019. This 'model mile' winds alongside North Fork Peachtree Creek between Briarwood Road and N. Druid Hills Road. Though the trail is nestled in a busy urban area, it feels removed from the hustle and bustle of daily life. There are private access points to the trail that its residential and corporate neighbors can use to get some exercise and some respite from the vagaries of the day. The scenic path includes a custom bridge with bumpouts overlooking the creek.

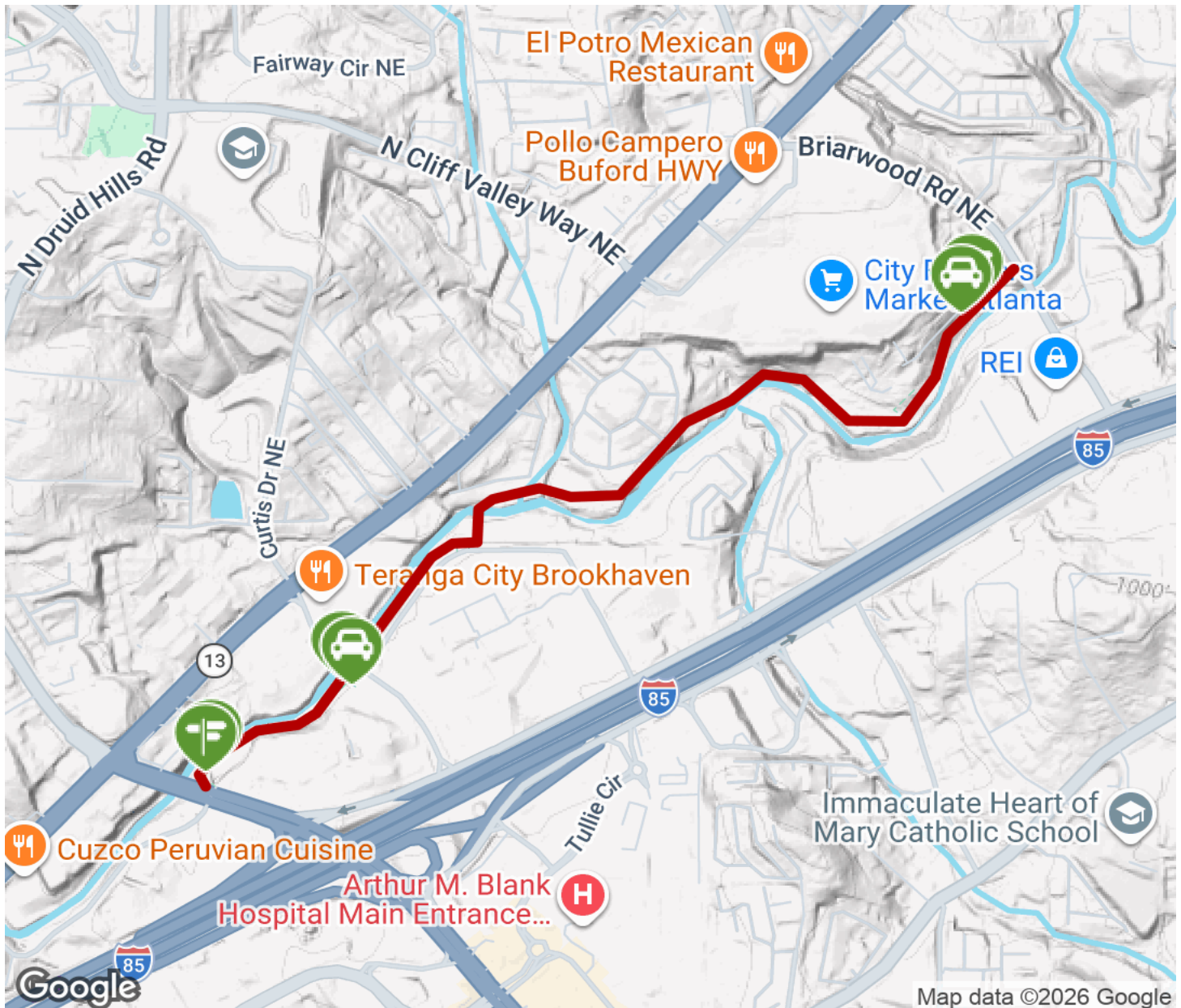
