Santa Rosa SMART Pathway

California

A part of the SMART Pathway system, the Santa Rosa Pathway is divided into two segments. The northern 1.4-mile section offers a



between the two sections of the trail. The 2.4-mile southwest section of the Santa Rosa Pathway runs from Hearn Avenue in downtown Santa Rosa to Bellevue Avenue. The tree-lined path continues to parallel the SMART commuter rail line. When complete, the SMART Pathway system will span 70 miles across California from Cloverdale to Larkspur.

A part of the SMART Pathway system, the Santa Rosa Pathway is divided into two segments. The northern 1.4-mile section offers a short, pleasant route from north Santa Rosa into the city's downtown. Running parallel to the SMART commuter rail line, the paved multi-use path is lined with trees and shrubbery. At trail's southern endpoint in downtown Santa Rosa, the southwestern section of the Santa Rosa Pathway can be reached via a short detour south on Wilson Street and west on W 3rd Street. Near the trail's endpoint, there is secure eLocker bike parking at 1500 Guerneville Rd, which is part of a pay-to-use bike parking/rental network. The nearby [Joe Rodota Trail](#) and [Santa Rosa Creek Trail](#) can both be accessed in downtown Santa Rosa as well.

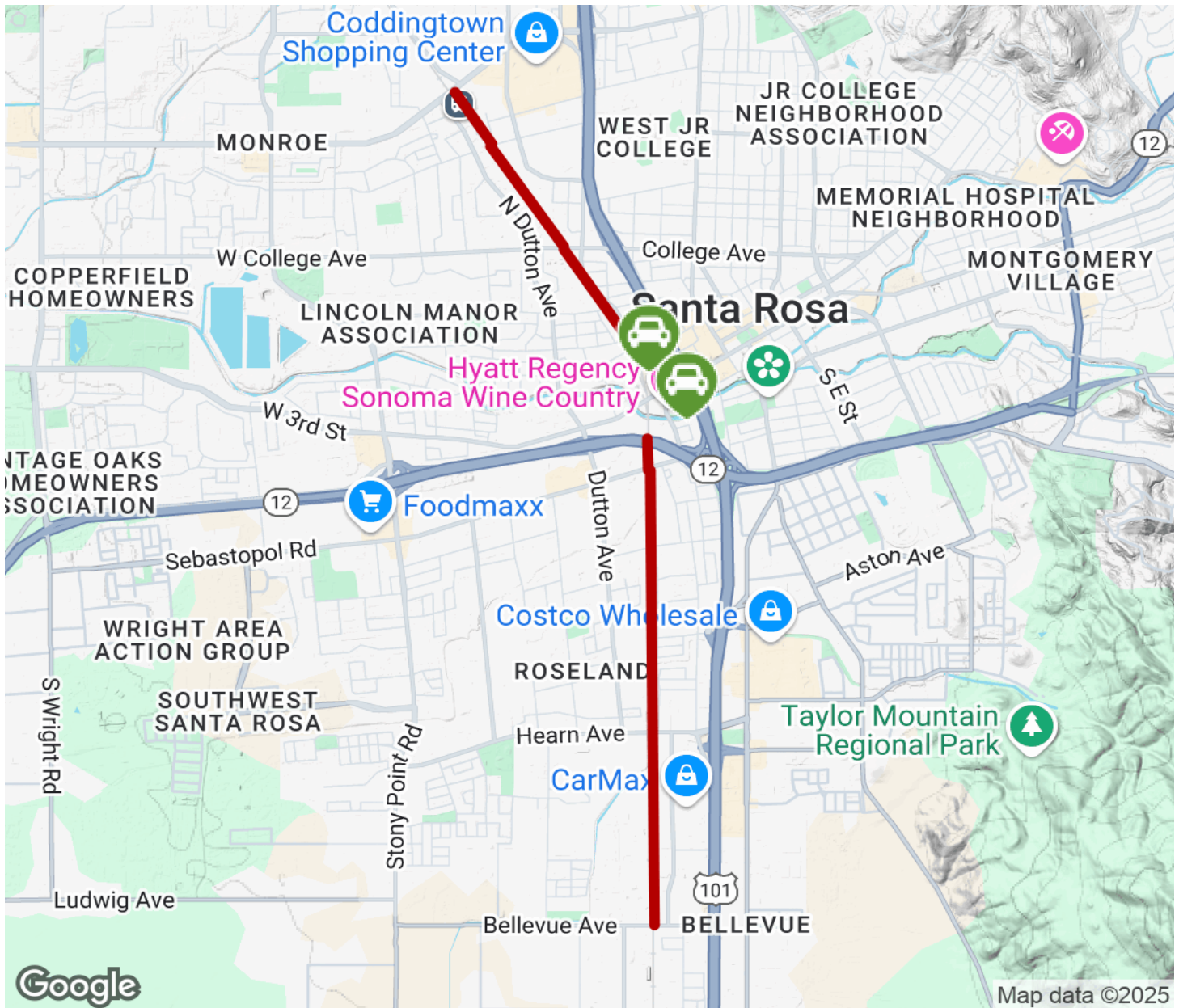
Parking & Trail Access
