Starting at the trail's northern endpoint at Walnut Hills Parking Lot at Cargill Long Park, where the Cargill Long Park Trail also



parking lot. The [Paul G. Boorman Trail](#) is also accessible from this parking lot.

The three Longview Trails combine to form an excellent 10-mile loop through various parks and greenways that the park has to offer.

Starting at the trail's northern endpoint at Walnut Hills Parking Lot at Cargill Long Park, where the [Cargill Long Park Trail](#) also starts off, Guthrie Trail follows Oakland Creek through a densely-wooded area as it passes the Longview Regional Medical Center.

After a mile, the trail cuts through Akin Park, which has tennis courts, a playground, and a designated picnic area. The trail continues through Akin Park and south along the banks of Oakland Creek. At Judson Rd. (TX 502), the trail passes through a pedestrian tunnel. Here, the trail begins to follow Guthrie creek, and passes through Guthrie Park, a 28 acre park with disc golf, pickleball and tennis courts and picnic area. After passing through another pedestrian tunnel at McCann Rd. (TX 63), Guthrie trail continues south until ending at a Highway 80

Parking & Trail Access

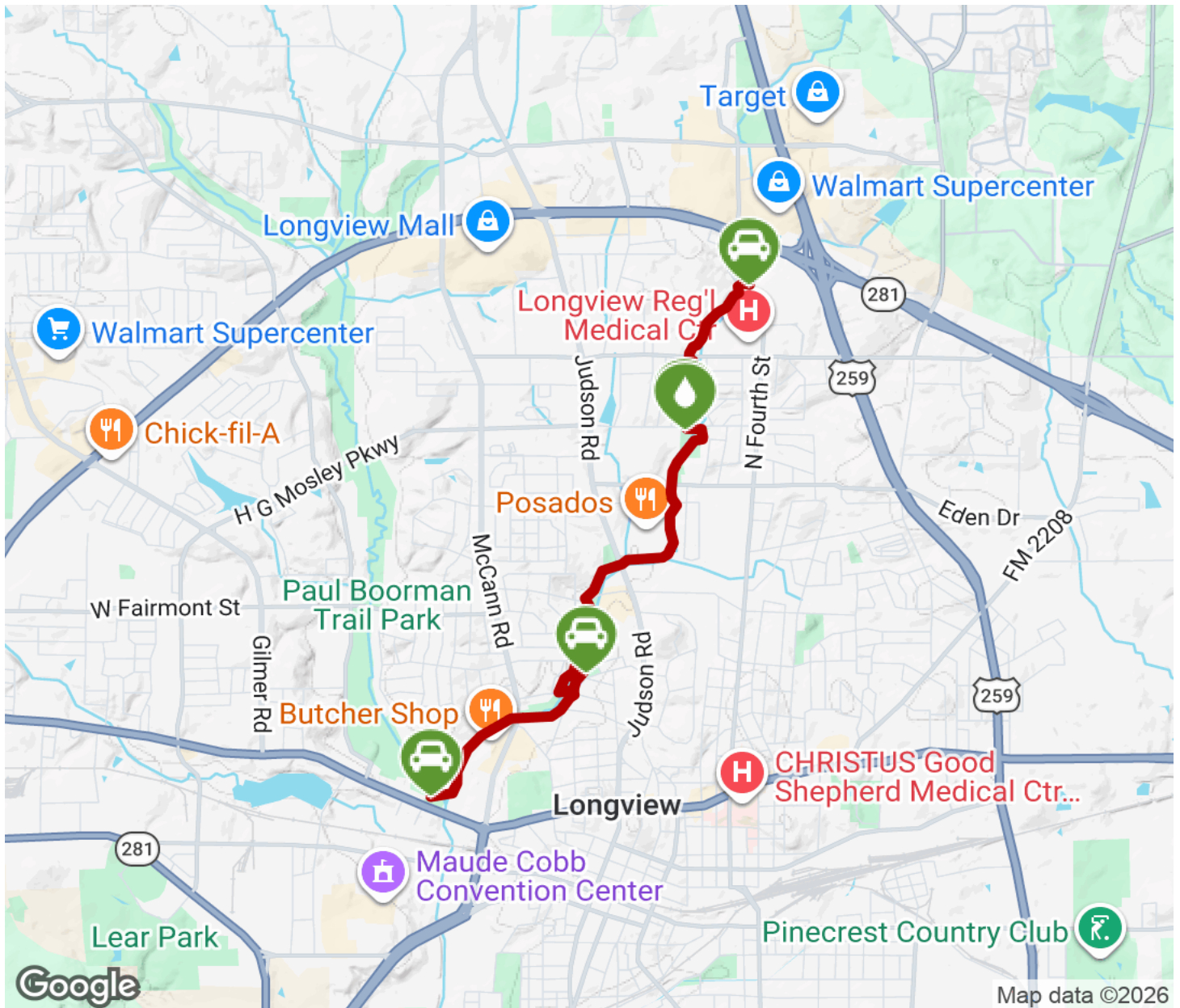
