The Animas River Trail runs for 10.22 miles along the scenic Animas River in Durango, Colorado, and follows the Durango and



Along the way, trail users will find many interpretive signs and trailside facilities. During summer watch the kayakers and inner-tube floaters along the river.

The Animas River Trail runs for 10.22 miles along the scenic Animas River in Durango, Colorado, and follows the Durango and Silverton Narrow Gauge Railroad corridor for parts of its route. During summer, about eight trains per day run along the tracks; in Durango, the trains travel a maximum of 15-20 mph.

About the Route

The trail extends between Oxbow Park and Preserve in the north and River Road in the south, where it crosses the bridge to end at La Posta Road. Along its entire route, the trail cuts through several city parks and across five bridges.

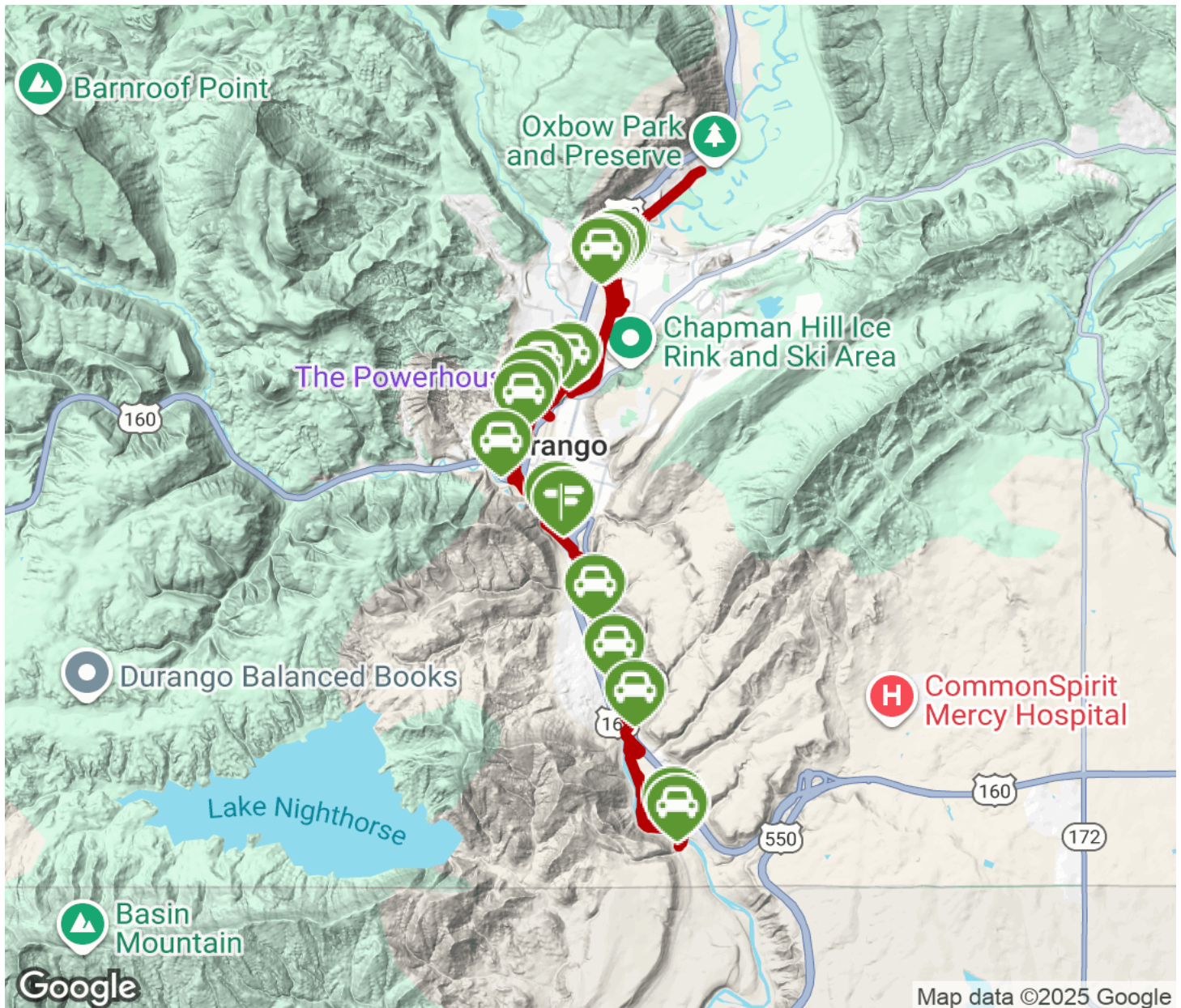
