The Lowell Parkway Trail runs through the charming town of Dixon, Illinois, boyhood home of Ronald Reagan. The trail occupies the rail bed of the old Illinois Central Railroad, between Lowell Park and John C. Roe Park, on the northwest side of the Rock River.

The scenic trail passes through lovely parks and a landscape of forest and cultivated fields. The Lowell Parkway Trail is popular with walkers, cyclists, joggers, wildlife-watchers and other outdoor recreationists. Benches along the trail and a picnic shelter make for peaceful places to sit and enjoy the scenery. There are also additional gravel trails in both Meadows and Lowell parks, the latter of which is on the National Register of Historic Places and has a designated Illinois Nature Preserve. 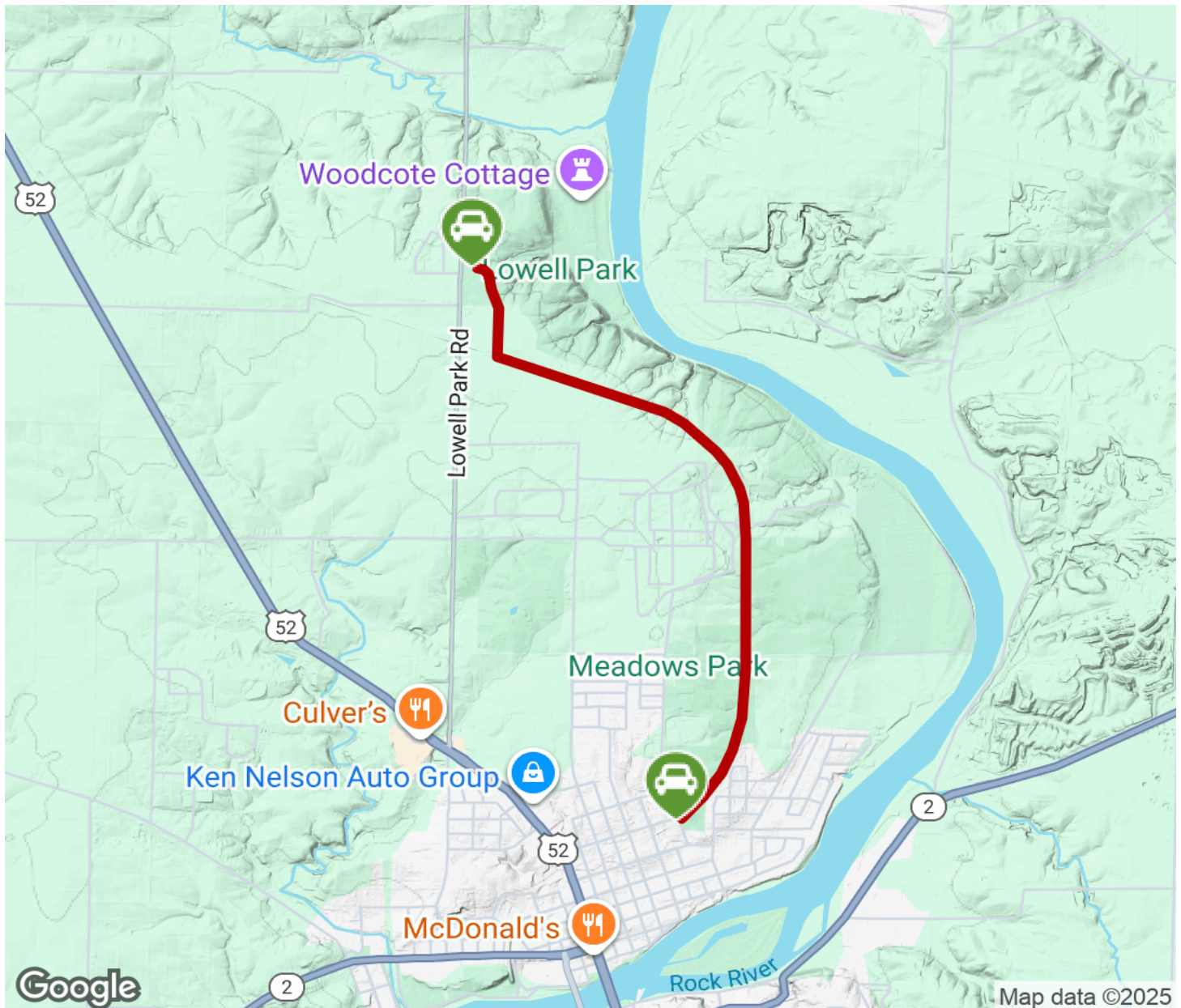
