State Route 20 Arboreta Trail Washington



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The State Route 20 Arboreta Trail—also known as the Highway 20 Trail—was developed in the 1970s after a donation of the right-of-way to the City of Burlington by a private citizen. The trail, which is wedged between SR 20/ Cascade Highway and active BNSF Railway tracks, runs for nearly a mile east from downtown Burlington to District Line Road. Within Burlington city limits, the trail is paved; the remainder is crushed stone.

The tree-lined trail occupies the same former rail corridor as the much longer <u>Cascade Trail</u> stretching from Sedro-Woolley (just a few miles east of Burlington) to the small town of Concrete.



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Parking & Trail Access


Parking for the State Route 20 Arboreta Trail can be found just to the west of the trail off N. Anacortes Street.
