Astoria Riverwalk Oregon



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Located near the mouth of the Columbia River as it empties into the Pacific Ocean, Astoria's working waterfront is a hub of activity. Boats that empty the day's catch dock next to the elegant cruise ships that take visitors down the historic Columbia River. Workers at the various seafood processing centers and canneries walk among the tourists, who are eager to explore the town where many of their favorite movies were filmed. In short, the Astoria Riverwalk is a perfect way for trail users to immerse themselves in the quintessential Pacific Northwest experience.

About the Route

Heading east from the northwest point of Astoria at Pier 3, the trail largely follows the former Astoria & Columbia River Railroad. For almost the entire 6.4-mile journey, it parallels the tracks of the historic Astoria Riverfront Trolley, which operates from late March through the end of October. Pay special attention when the trolley is operating: The trail often shares the same bridge as the trolley, and trail users will have multiple crossings on the trolley tracks, which can be slippery when wet. Trail users on wheels should cross the tracks at a 90-degree angle to prevent falls.

About 1 mile into the trip, the trail crosses under the Astoria-Megler Bridge, the longest continuous-truss bridge in North America. Travel another 2 miles to find two unique sites directly off the trail: Astoria Nordic Heritage Park educates visitors on the city's rich Nordic heritage, with cute yet funky trolls setting the mood. Two blocks away lies the Columbia River Maritime Museum, which delves into the fishing, shipping, and military history of the area.

A true gem along the trail lies another 1.3 miles east. Take a left on the wooden bridge on 39th Street to find a vibrant commercial area that includes the donation-only, self-guided Hanthorn Cannery Museum. Inside, visitors will find a fascinating variety of information on the history of the city's canning industry.

While there, look up at the hillside to the right. Movie fans of a certain age may recognize a white house with red trim. It's the iconic house that needed to be saved in the 1980s classic The Goonies. Astoria has embraced its film history, and signage along the Riverwalk highlights locations from other popular films, such as Kindergarten Cop, Short Circuit, and Free Willy.

From here to the eastern end of the trail at Alder Street, stopping to take in the sights along the Columbia River and adjacent wetlands will reward trail users with spottings of native wildlife, including seals, eagles, cormorants, and
