Overview The Green River Trail currently stretches 21.1 miles through the industrial heart of the Green River Valley from the



the Lake to Sound Trail near the Black River Riparian Forest.

Connections

Direct connections to the [Interurban Trail](#) can be found twice along the Green River Trail; the first is in the north near Fort Dent Park and the second is at the trail's southern end near Foster Park on S. 259th Street.

A short portion of the trail is also part of the [Lake to Sound Trail](#) near the Black River Riparian Forest.

Overview

The Green River Trail currently stretches 21.1 miles through the industrial heart of the Green River Valley from the southern suburbs of Seattle to Kent, connecting to a number of neighborhoods and parks.

About the Route

The Green River Trail follows Washington's scenic Green River for its entire route. The paved trail meanders along the river between Tukwila and Kent. The southern terminus currently ends just north of Kent's North Green River Park, long-term plans for the future call for an extension farther south through Auburn to Flaming Geyser State Park. 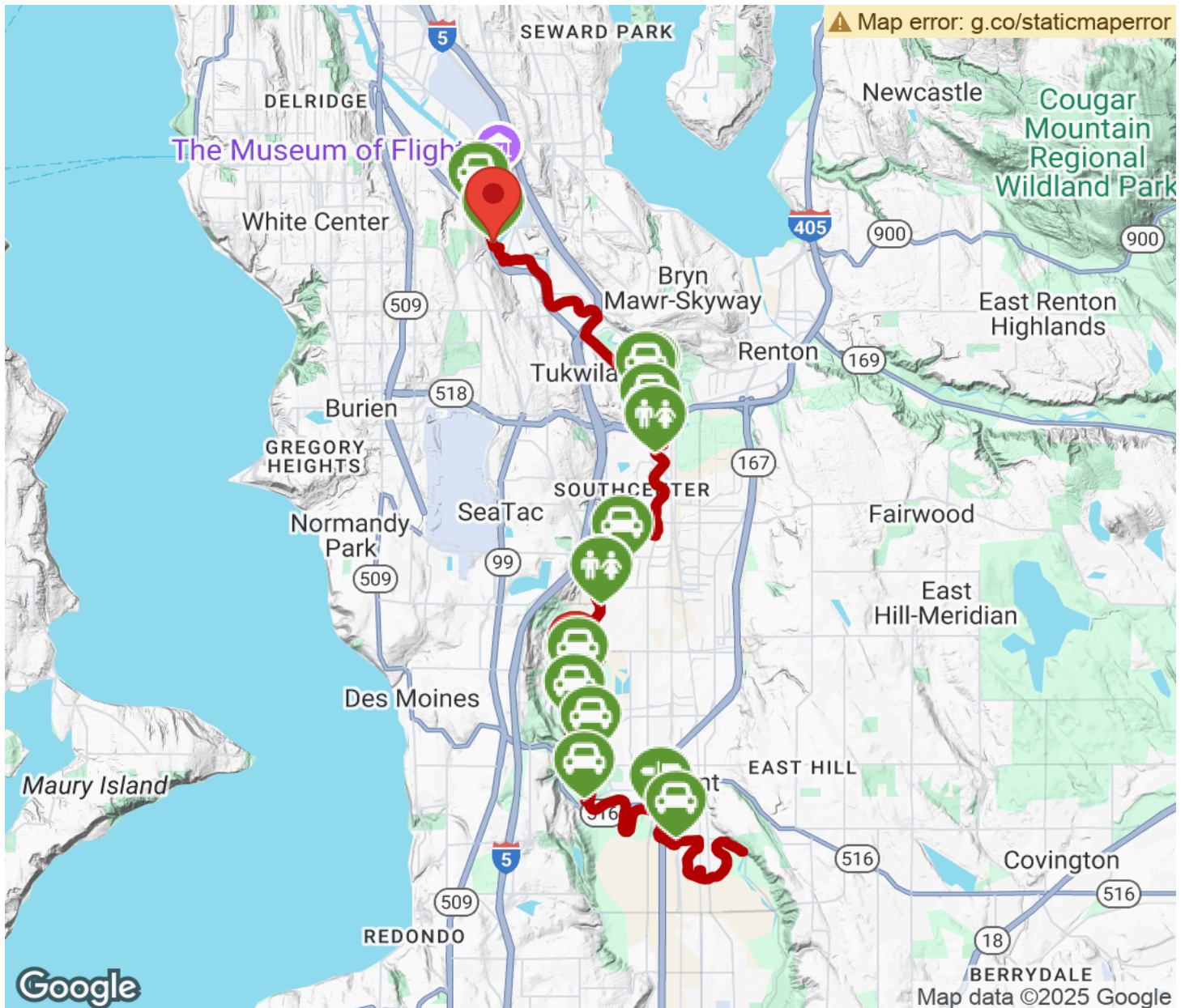
