

The Hook Mountain/Nyack Beach Bikeway is a scenic trail that runs almost 5 miles along the Hudson River in Rockland County.



this trail is flat and runs right along the river at sea level. It is wheelchair accessible from the parking lot at Nyack Beach State Park and even beginner bicyclists can easily travel on it. There is a paved connection to the Rockland Lake State Park area from this trail.

Great views of the Hudson River and Palisades Cliffs rock formations are available from either trail segment.

The Hook Mountain/Nyack Beach Bikeway is a scenic trail that runs almost 5 miles along the Hudson River in Rockland County.

About the Route

The trail runs through Hook Mountain State Park and Rockland Lake State Park between Haverstraw Beach State Park and Nyack Beach State Park.

The northern half of the trail is also known as the Haverstraw River Trail and is hilly, narrow and quite rocky. It runs along the cliffs and should only be ridden by experienced bicyclists riding bikes in good condition.

Parking & Trail Access


