Bear Creek Greenway

The Bear Creek Greenway is a 20.6-mile paved multi-use trail that travels through creek-side woods and natural areas, connecting



are all welcome, and horses are allowed on designated portions in Central Point and Talent.

The trail is louder in some places where it follows Interstate 5 and State Route 99. Some of the notable parks along the route include Bear Creek Park and U.S. Cellular Park in Medford and a popular dog park just north of the southern terminus in Ashland. The trail also passes Medford Railroad Park, a 49-acre outdoor train museum with model railroad tracks, full-size train cars and miniature steam train rides.

The Bear Creek Greenway is a 20.6-mile paved multi-use trail that travels through creek-side woods and natural areas, connecting five communities and eight parks along its course.

About the Route

The trail runs for 20.6 miles from Central Point, through the heart of Medford, to Ashland. At its northern end, the trail meanders through the grounds of the Jackson County Expo/Fairgrounds.

The greenway provides a serene place to exercise, bird watch or simply enjoy a quiet escape to nature. Benches located along the trail offer a place to sit and relax. Walkers, joggers, bicyclists, skaters and wheelchair users
