San Juan Creek Trail

California

The 6-mile San Juan Creek Trail provides a 6-mile route between Dana Point and the neighborhoods of San Juan Capistrano. About



northeast of I-5, and a parallel soft-surface path for equestrian users runs from just west of La Novia Avenue to the trail's end at Avenida Siega.

Connections

At the trail bridge over Trabuco Creek, trail users can connect to the [Robert McCollum Memorial Bicycle Trail](#).

The 6-mile San Juan Creek Trail provides a 6-mile route between Dana Point and the neighborhoods of San Juan Capistrano.

About the Route

The San Juan Creek Trail leaves off in the south where the creek meets the Pacific Ocean at Doheny State Beach in scenic Dana Point. From there, it runs on the levee along the western bank of San Juan Creek to its confluence with Trabuco Creek at Descanso Park in San Juan Capistrano.

Alternatively, continue east on the San Juan Creek Trail to reach far eastern neighborhoods of San Juan Capistrano, passing under Interstate 5 and running next to Calle Arroyo along the way. Several horse stables line the trail

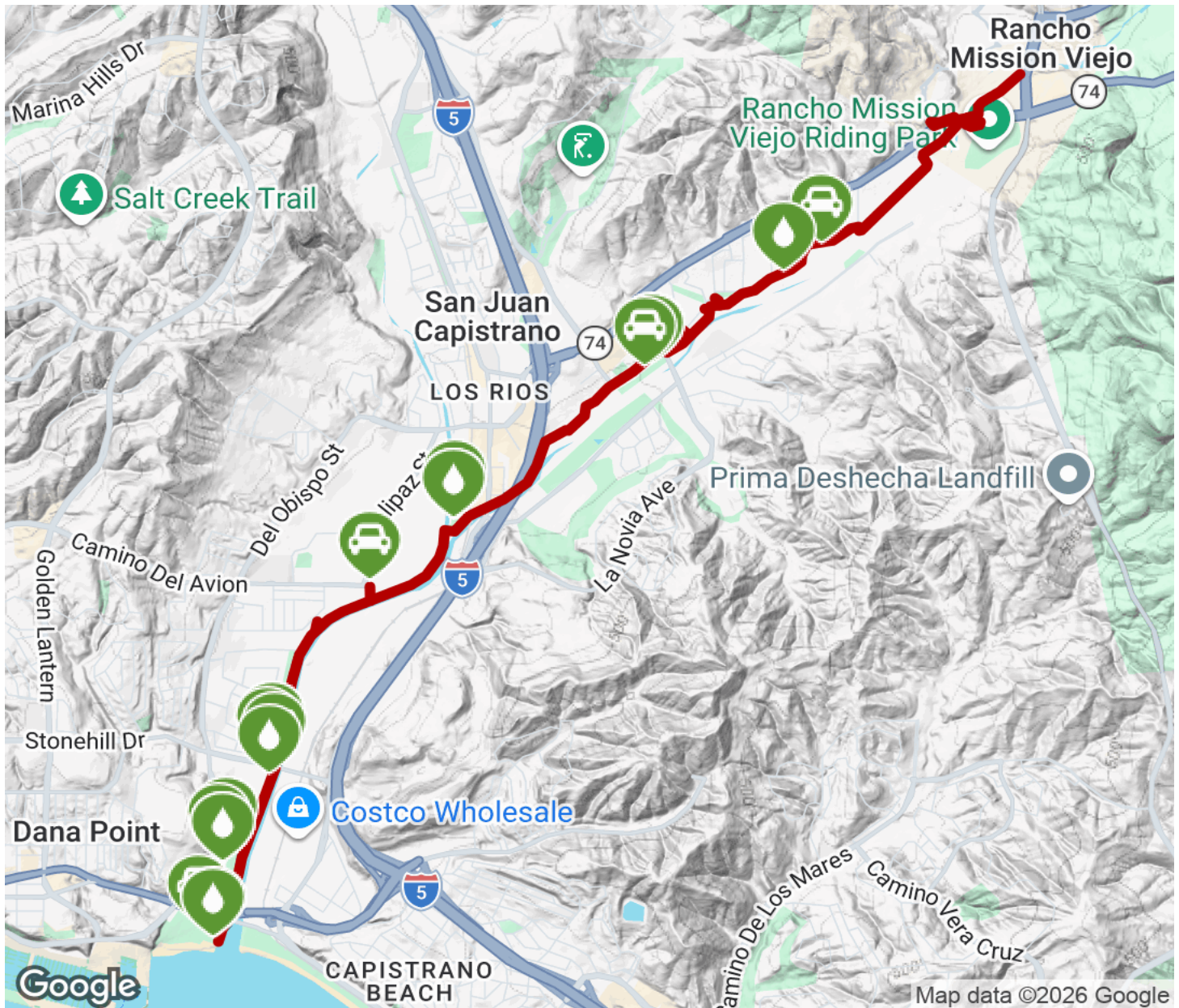
