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The Glenwood Canyon Recreation Trail is a 15.5-mile trail that follows the winding course of the Colorado River between Glenwood



Connections

In Glenwood Springs, trail users can hook up with the [Rio Grande Trail](#), which heads south and east to Aspen.

The Glenwood Canyon Recreation Trail is a 15.5-mile trail that follows the winding course of the Colorado River between Glenwood Springs and Dotsero. The paved trail is easygoing and heavily used by outdoor recreationists of all pursuits. The trail is closed in winter and sometimes into the spring when the water level in the Colorado River is high. There are plenty of resting areas, as well as picnic sites, restrooms, and fishing access points.

About the Route

Along this scenic trail through the river canyon, trail users may spot wildlife, including a band of bighorn sheep introduced into the area in the early '90s. Trail users will also see plenty of people floating on this stretch of river, which also shares the corridor with Interstate 70.

Parking & Trail Access


