Closure Notice: A 200 ft. section of the Whitehorse Trail is closed 1.7 miles east of the Trafton Trailhead due to a washout and bank



parallels the North Fork Stillaguamish River and the SR 530 but also for a majority of the route, trail users are treated to uninterrupted wilderness views. The trail surface is a majority gravel and dirt, be prepared for possibly bumpy, rough surfaces. But in addition to the wilderness terrain, users are treated to scenic views of mountains, streams, forests and rolling farmland.

At its eastern endpoint, the trail connects to the [Centennial Trail](#) in Arlington.

Closure Notice: A 200 ft. section of the Whitehorse Trail is closed 1.7 miles east of the Trafton Trailhead due to a washout and bank erosion of the trail from river flooding. The trail closure is fenced off and there is no detour available at this time. The coordinates of the closure are: 48.25125° N, 122.04946° W. Please check [Snohomish County](#) for updates.

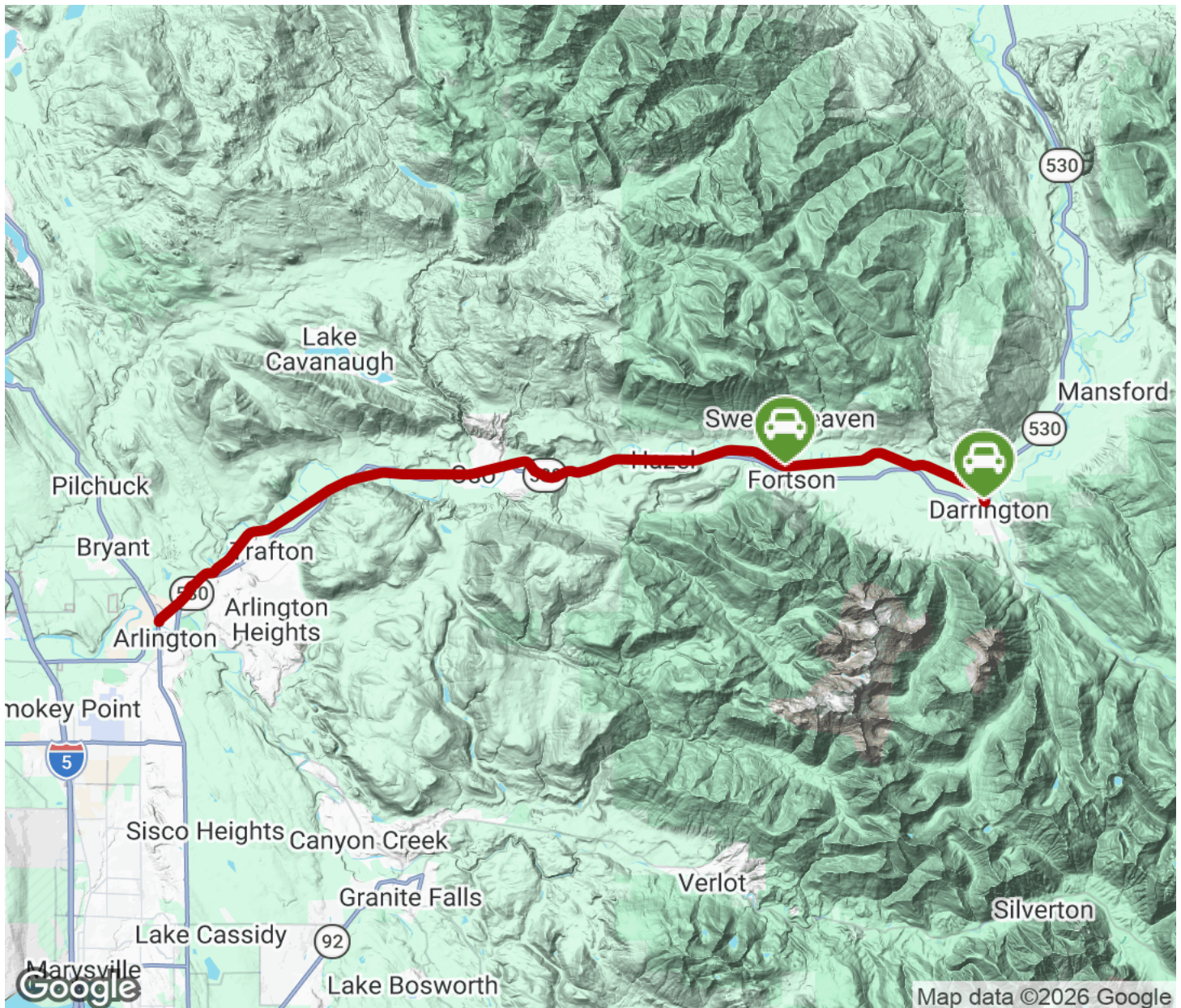
