The Hudson River Waterfront Walkway cruises along the Hudson river waterfront with spectacular views of the neighboring New



Along it's 22 mile route, the Walkway passes notable sight including the Weehawken Waterfront Park, Steven's Institute of Technology, Hoboken Bus Station and Ferry Terminal, Liberty State Park (with premium views of Ellis Island and Lady Liberty), the infamous Carlo's Bakery, and of course, the uninterrupted New York City Skyline its whole length.

The Hudson River Waterfront Walkway cruises along the Hudson river waterfront with spectacular views of the neighboring New York City skyline for nearly 22 miles. Made up of a series of boardwalks, riverside paths and more, the Hudson River Waterfront Walkway provides a trail users a scenic opportunity to escape the city life and get out and get active.

Starting with a short section in Fort Lee at Rock Dock Park, the trail then travels south all the way to Dennis P. Collins Park in Bayonne. A majority of the trail's mileage is concentrated in the middle mileages of the trail in Jersey City, Hoboken, Union City and Woodcliff, all though there are still many gaps along this section, it is still where more of the mileage is concentrated.


Parking & Trail Access
