Connections

The Clayton Riverwalk is part of the longer Neuse River Trail.

At the southern end of the trail, it connects to Sam's Branch Greenway.

The Clayton Riverwalk is part of the developing East Coast Greenway, a 3,000-mile route between Florida and Maine.

The Clayton Riverwalk is a paved, 10-foot-wide, four-mile route along the tree-lined Neuse River in the Town of Clayton, about 20 miles southeast of Raleigh. It is part of the greater Neuse River Trail, which continues past the northern end of the trail to the eastern outskirts of Raleigh for nearly 30 miles.

About the Route

The northern end of the trail is a dead end, where the Neuse River Greenway Trail continues north, unmarked. The nearest trail access point is either north on the Neuse River Greenway Trail along the Mial Plantation Rd. or south on the Clayton Riverwalk along Covered Bridge Rd.

The trail largely follows the Neuse River through a largely

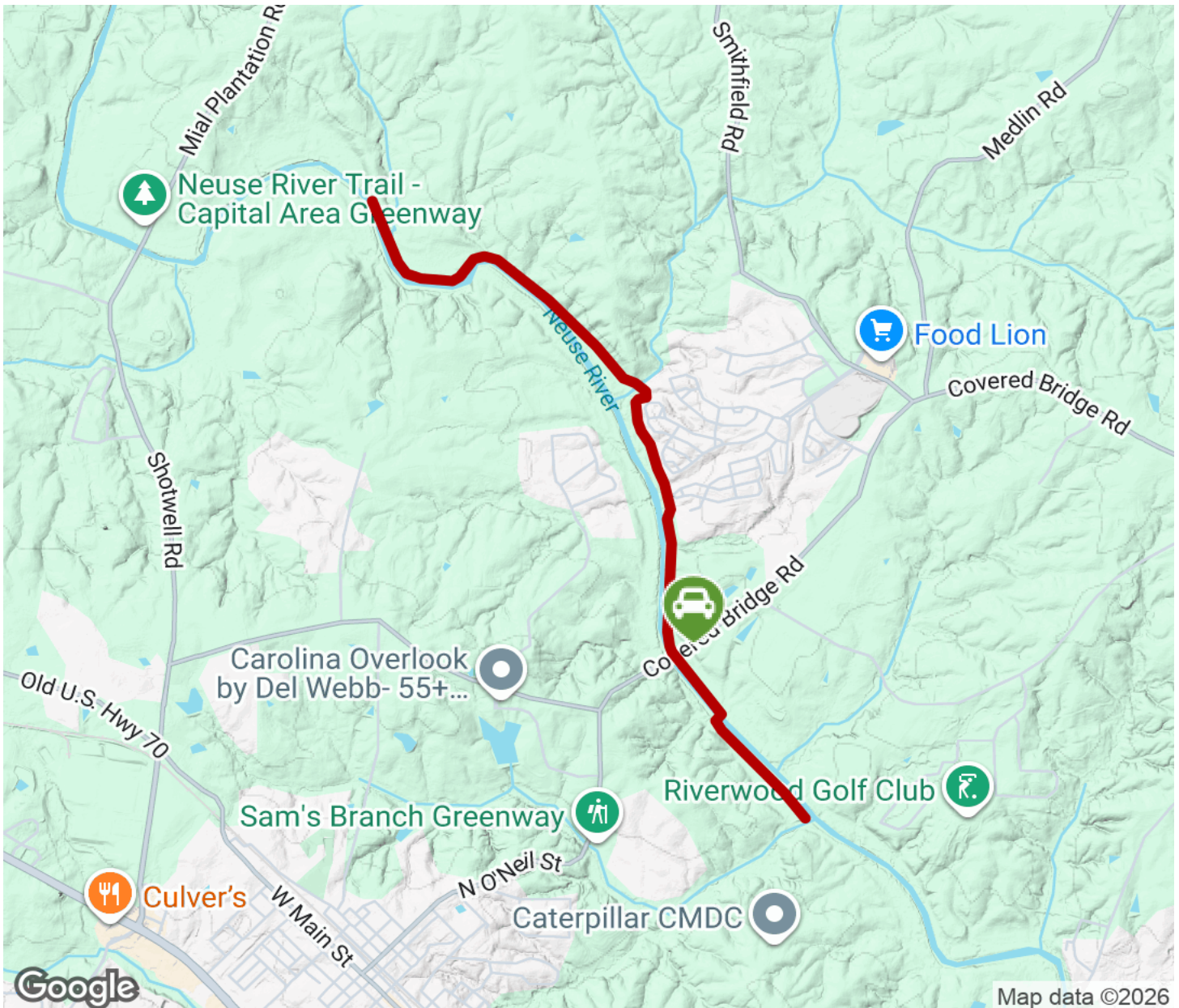
