## I-5 Trail

*The I-5 Trail is available in two disconnected segments that are roughly equivalent in size with each being about 2 miles long. The*



After a short gap, the southern segment picks up on the southwest side of the fairgrounds. Here, you can visit the Douglas County Museum, which shares both the natural history of the Umpqua River Valley and the story of the region's people. The trail continues south along the river, crossing it once just more before ending in the small community of Green.

The I-5 Trail is available in two disconnected segments that are roughly equivalent in size with each being about 2 miles long.

The northern segment leaves from Roseburg's busy shopping area along Garden Valley Boulevard and heads south along the interstate and into the pleasant tree cover of Riverfront Park. There, you can hop on the [Roseburg Park Loop](#) to visit several of the city's other parks, or cross the South Umpqua River and continue on the main trail as it skirts along Roseburg High School. The trail winds along the river, nestled between the water and I-5, separated from the interstate by a wide grassy slope and trees. The paved pathway ends just north of the Douglas County Fairgrounds.
