The Klingle Valley Trail spans just shy of a mile in a leafy, residential area of northwest Washington, DC. The trail opened in June 2017 and is accessible to the neighborhoods of Cleveland Park, Woodley Park, and Mount Pleasant.

The paved pathway follows a small brook and traces the route of a former roadway, Klingle Road. On its eastern end, near Porter Street NW, travelers can connect to the city's [Rock Creek trail system](#) to extend their journey. The western end of the trail ends near Cortland Place.

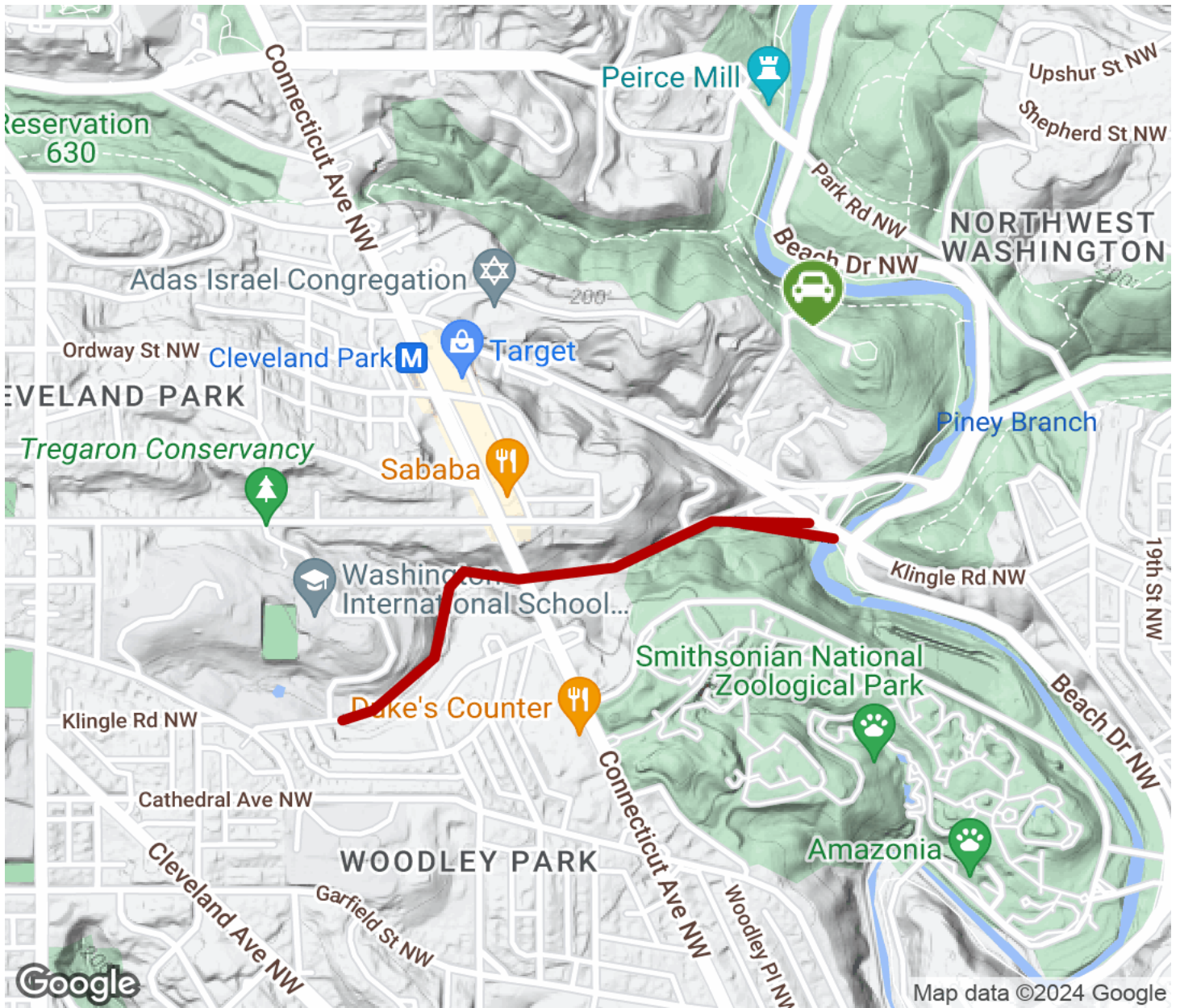
