

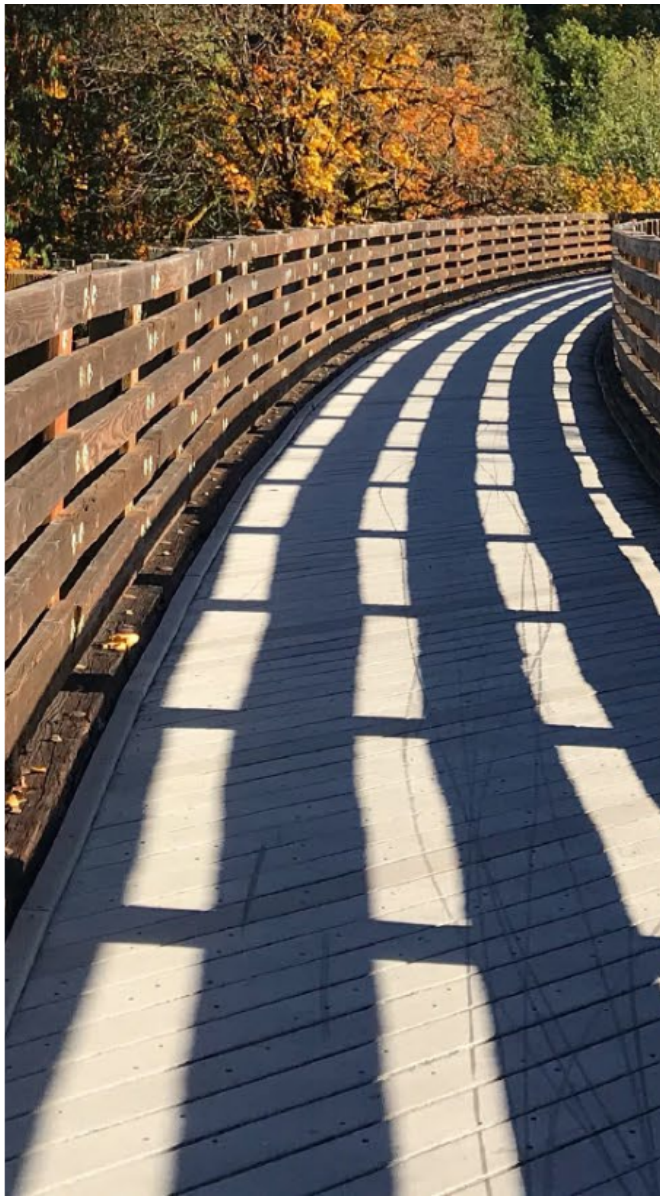

The Paseo de la Resaca Community Trail is a 7-mile meandering multiuse path in Brownsville, Texas. Surrounded by residential



Paredes Elementary School, Margret M. Clark Aquatic Center, and Hudson Elementary School, making it a safe route to school for many students.

The Paseo de la Resaca Community Trail is a 7-mile meandering multiuse path in Brownsville, Texas. Surrounded by residential neighborhoods, the scenic concrete trail runs along a network of tranquil waterways. Underpasses whisk you safely under intersecting streets while boardwalk bridges at different points take you over the water. Trail amenities include pergolas, benches, picnic tables, wayfinding signs, playgrounds and lighting.

While residents and visitors have several areas to access this trail, the most popular starting point is at the Brownsville Event Center. The Event Center offers ample parking, a playground, public restrooms, a water fountain, a deck on the water, picnic tables, and it is where the Paseo de la Resaca Community Trail connects to the [Historic Battlefield Trail](#). 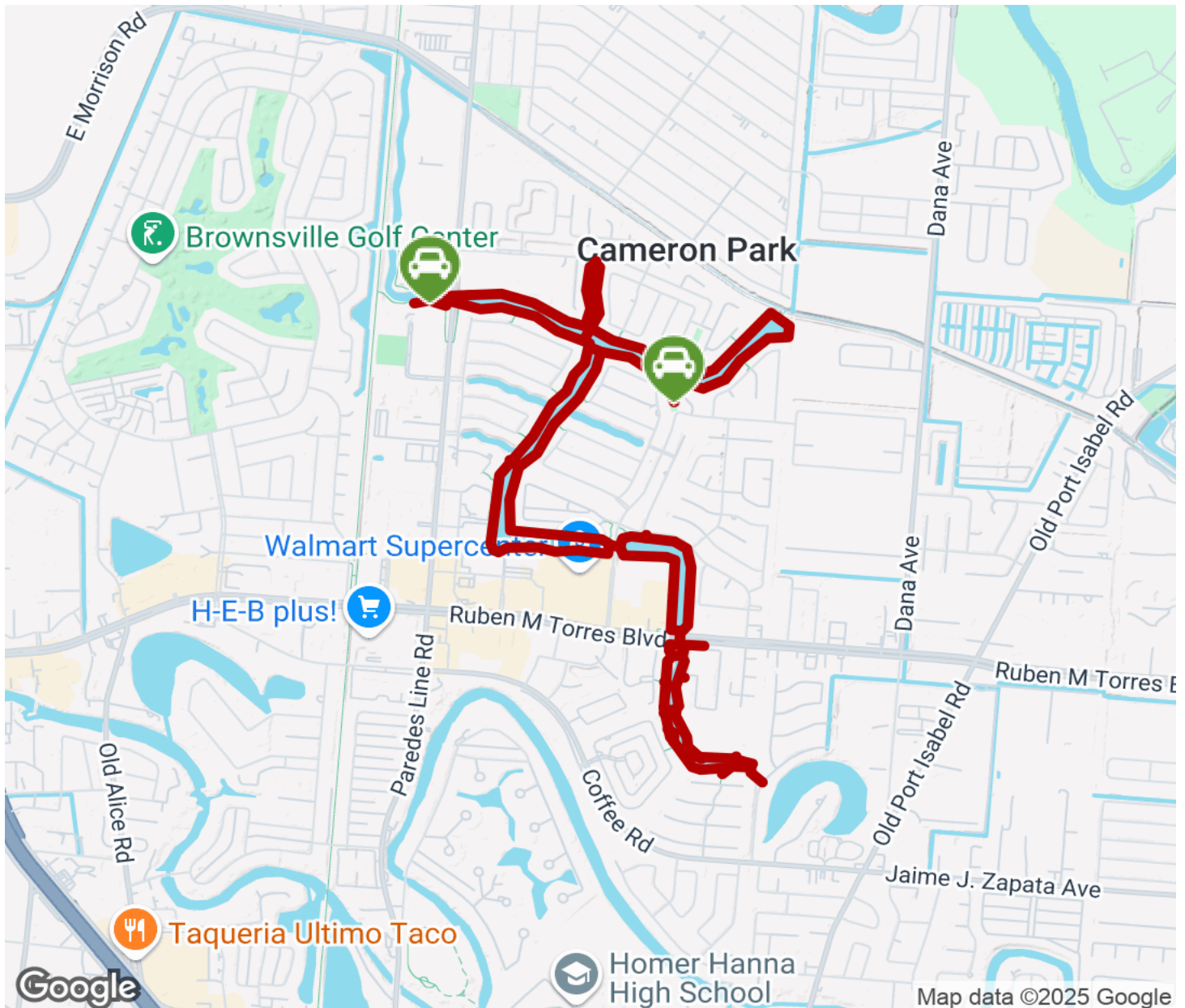
