Nokomis-Minnesota River Regional Trail

Nokomis-Minnesota River Regional Trail contributes 7 miles to the Twin Cities' extensive network of regional trails. The paved path is



[Greenway](#). While most crossings are at grade, there are two bridges, one over State Route 62 and the other spanning I-494.

Nokomis-Minnesota River Regional Trail contributes 7 miles to the Twin Cities' extensive network of regional trails. The paved path is 10-foot wide, providing room for a variety of trail users including bicyclists, joggers, walkers and inline skaters. It's a north-south trail across three communities: Minneapolis, Richfield and Bloomington.

As it travels south, it goes through residential neighborhoods, into parks and near retail and entertainment destinations including the famous Mall of America in Bloomington, and the Minneapolis-St. Paul International Airport. It also links with other trails in the system: at its north end it joins the [Grand Rounds Scenic Byway](#), a 50-mile network of trails. In Richfield, it connects to the [Nine Mile Creek Regional Trail](#). At its south end, the trail connects with the [Minnesota River](#)

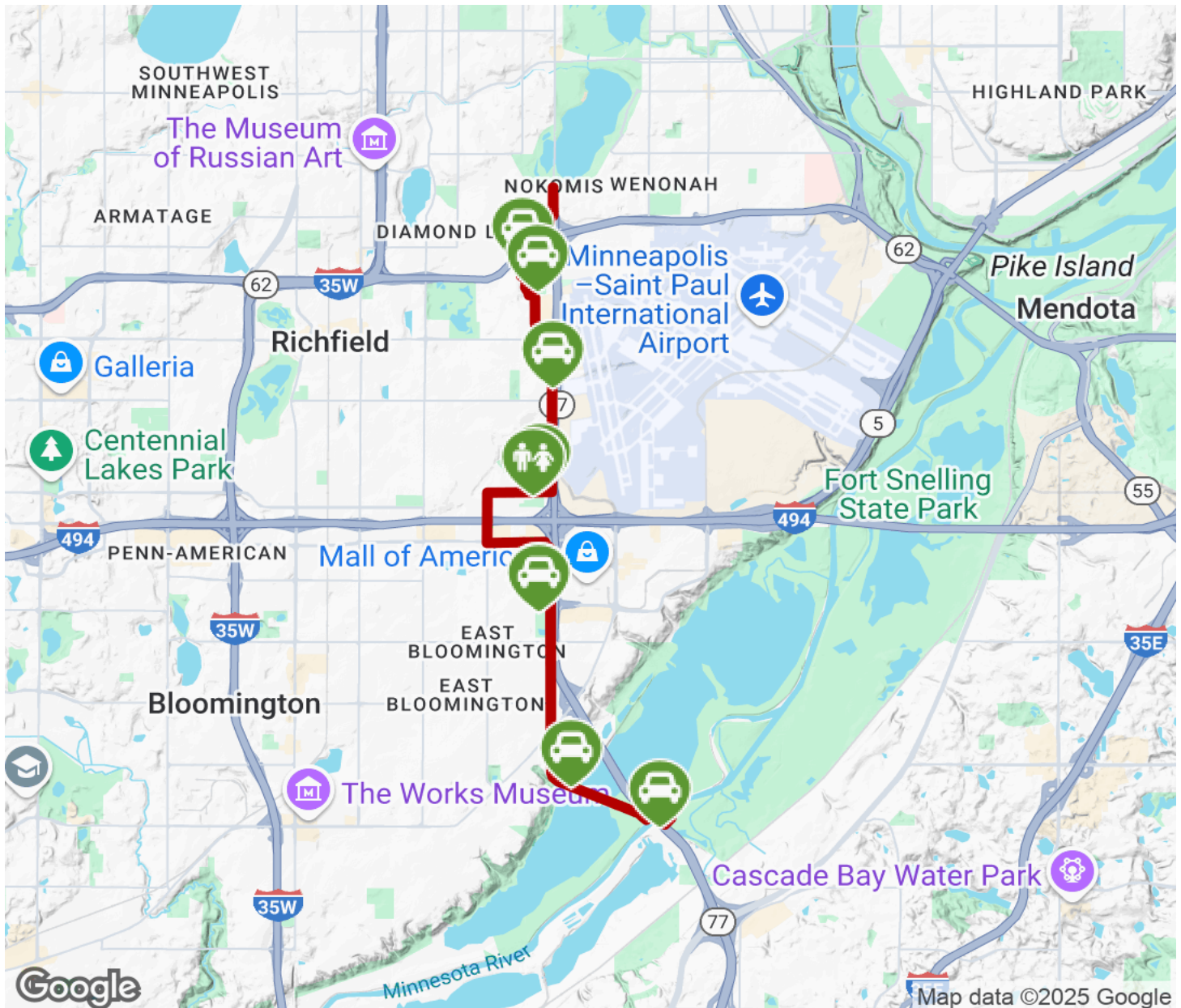
